Diversifying regional economies is essential to growing rural towns. In regions like the Yarra Ranges in Victoria the same changes are underfoot in rethinking forest recovery to ensure that the myriad of other rural businesses can flourish - not just that of the woodchippers.

The woodchip industry is dying but not because of green voters or conservationists but because of new international woodchip trade out of Chile, China, Vietnam, Bazil and Siberia. Theses countries are flooding the market with cheaper chips and along with the high Australian dollar and low environmental credentials of Australian government logging agencies, Australia's chips are unappetising. The future for towns like Eden will be in growing tourism and capitalising on forests for their unique splendour. What is left of the forests, after a long run of the extractive industries, should now become the cornerstone of greater employment opportunities.

The Tourism industry on the south coast employs 58 463 people, the native forest woodshipping.

- -The Tourism industry on the south coast employs $58\,463$ people, the native forest woodchipping groups 200.
- -The state run logging agency, Forestry Corporation, loses \$14-\$16M a year in the native forest sector.
- -Bega Valley Shire Council approved the pellet mill- green groups opposed the proposal.
- -BVSC disallowed the wind farm- green groups supported the proposal.

Native forest is not renewable nor is it 'waste'. The only waste is the \$14-16 Million dollar loss every year that FCNSW incur- and this will not be alleviated by allowing trees to be logged for burning. It will allow a multinational corporation which is wholly Japanese owned to continue its activities. Burning native forest for power can release more carbon dioxide into the atmosphere than coal or gas. Replacing one polluting fuel with another, when there are genuine renewable options like solar and wind, is illogical. Further NSW must abide by Federal and international obligations under the Kyoto Protocol.

There is a small logging town in the far south of New Zealand which was extremely worried when NZ legislated to end native forest logging in 2002. However they had a huge international draw cardwhales. They worked hard and turned the mill into a resort with cabins. Now if you want to visit it is a three year waiting list.
